So there are several movies about Martin Luther. But there are really two "biggies."



The earlier one was made in 1953. I doubt that most people have heard of any of the actors, although they certainly do a fine job. The film is rich in information. If such a thing is possible, it's almost too much so. In other words, the more you already know about the Reformation, the more sense it makes; and the less you know, the harder the film is to follow.



It's filmed in black-and-white. Unfortunately, some of the scenes are so dark it's literally hard to see what's going on. It obviously was not a large-budget film, and the director soldiers on to make a commendable film


about the great reformer.

Many of our older members (a group I consider myself to be a part of) will have not only seen it; they've probably seen it over and over again. Some churches used to show this film every October. I'm not sure why that tradition has ended. Does it need to be revived?

Did I mention how much detail it has? No surprise, the writing credits involve two men who wrote the screenplay, and two theologians (Theodore Tappert and Jaroslav Pelikan) who worked on the details.

The more recent film is called "Luther," and it was made in 2003. It's got a cast of actors you've heard of (Joseph Fiennes, Alfred Molina, Peter Ustinov, and Bruno Ganz). In contrast to the earlier movie, it's not only filmed in color, the quality of the filming is very high. After watching the 1953 movie, you'd be inclined to call this one "bright."

The movie contains much fewer details than the earlier movie; but its pace is good, and you can always follow what's going on. Some things are left out; but everything necessary is there. And it probably benefits



from transmitting a higher percentage of its content to the viewer because you're not lost in the fog of trying to keep up. Joseph Fiennes is particularly good as Luther, and the supporting cast makes this one an easily watch-able, easily enjoyable movie. Which is better? The easy answer is that you ought to see both. Even better: see them both more than once. Then you can make up your own mind about which you like better.

Of course St. Paul once famously wrote that no one was baptized into the name of Paul (1st Cor. 1:13). In the same way, no one was baptized into the name of Luther either.

Martin Luther was just a man. He was used powerfully by God at a particular time in the history of the Church, when his particular skills were very much needed. We are heirs of his work, and rightly celebrate the work of the Reformation.

We celebrate it, as long as we remember that the work of the Reformation was always and everywhere to esteem Christ, who alone is the Savior, who alone died for your sins, and who alone rose again for the guarantee of our eternal life. Many men and women have brought that message to us. But the Message Himself is Jesus.

So long as Jesus is central, the Church, I think, does well to remember the saints "gone before us." We remember how God has worked through them; and we ask that God keep us faithful in our own time.

Board of Stewardship: Reformation Sunday

This month we look forward to Reformation Sunday on October 30th and remember the Solas of the Reformation: Scripture alone. Grace alone. Faith alone. Christ alone. Remembering grace alone and faith alone I think of the 3rd verse of "Rock of Ages":

"Nothing in my hand I bring; Simply to Thy cross I cling. Naked, come to Thee for dress; Helpless, look to Thee for grace; Foul, I to the fountain fly; Wash me, Savior, or I die."

Remembering Scripture alone, September 2022 marked the 500th anniversary of the publication of the first edition of Martin Luther's translation of the New Testament into German in September 1522. See the September 2022 issue of *The Lutheran Witness* for greater detail.

On a more personal level, fifty years ago in October 1972, I began my first read through of the whole Bible from Genesis to Revelation. I finished it in August 1973. I was a freshman in the College of Engineering and was walking past the Russell House. I saw a street preacher's truck with several stern hellfire and damnation messages and the message, "Read the Bible while you are still able." I have not forgotten that message.



Remembering Christ alone, **Acts 4:12** states, "**And there is salvation in no one else; for there is no other name under heaven that has been given among men, by which we must be saved.**" To have faith in Jesus leads to eternal life; to lack that faith leads to eternal death.

Let us be in church weekly, in prayer and Bible study daily, and in Bible class when possible. Let us support this church with our time, efforts, and resources. Let us reach out to unbelieving and unchurched family, friends, co-workers, and neighbors.

The Board of Public Relations: More Church Symbols

"Fix these words of mine in your hearts and minds; tie them as symbols on your hands and bind them on your foreheads." Deuteronomy 11:18



The hand represents God the Father. The three fingers pointing up represent the three persons of the Trinity, and the circle around it is called a nimbus. In Christmas artwork, Jesus, Mary, Joseph, and the angels are often portrayed with a nimbus around their heads as a sign of sanctity, but Jesus' nimbus contains three rays within it to represent deity.



The fish represents Jesus, the Son of God. The Greek word for fish is **ichthus**. In the Greek language, it is spelled $IX\Theta YC$. These letters are an acronym, representing the first letter of five Greek words that in English mean "Jesus (I), Christ (X), God's (Θ), Son (Y), Savior (C)." Early Christians who were subject to persecution used this code to identify themselves to each other.

Read the Bible in Three Years -October 2022

Through the month of October, we will finish reading Nehemiah and follow with five of the books of minor prophets. Last, we will begin reading the major prophet Ezekiel. Here is a quick overview.

Nehemiah was written to chronicle the rebuilding of the temple and the city of Jerusalem after 70 years of captivity in Babylon. The first four minor prophet books that we will be reading are from different times in history to warn the northern kingdom of Israel or the southern kingdom of Judah (and other surrounding countries) of God's anger toward their unfaithfulness and to repent of their sin. Neither nation repents and both are defeated and taken into captivity, Israel in the 700's b.c. and Judah in the 600's-500's b.c. Then we fast forward to Nehemiah's time where Haggai and Ezekiel encourage those who are rebuilding Jerusalem.

During this whirlwind journey, you may want to check out the introductions to these books in your Lutheran Study Bible or listen to the overview of each book on The Bible Project website.
