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From Our Pastor: The Book of Judges, and Reformations

If you read the Bible-reading plan printed in our bulletin, you'll be reading through the book of Judges for the first half of October. This fits very nicely with our celebration of the Reformation later this month.





The background of the book of Judges is that the people of Israel have been led out of slavery, God having worked through Moses. Moses was followed by his capable assistant, Joshua. Both of these men were powerfully used by God, and although times were never perfect, there was a general posture of following God.

Alas, it did not remain so. According to Judges 2:8-10, "Joshua, son of Nun, the servant of the LORD, died at the age of a hundred and ten. And they buried him in the land of his inheritance, at Timnath Heres in the hill country of

they buried him in the land of his inheritance, at Timnath Heres in the hill country of Ephraim, north of Mount Gaash. After that whole generation had been gathered to their fathers, another generation grew up, who knew neither the LORD nor what He had done for Israel."

It always boggles the mind. If their parents knew the Lord, how is it said that the next generation did not? This phrasing doesn't mean that they'd never heard of the Lord, but that they no longer followed Him.

Here we are in chapter 2, and we're already discussing what will become the theme of the rest of the book. One generation will turn away from God; times will get tough; and eventually they will turn back to the true God, who will forgive and bless them.

Unfortunately, that cycle would repeat itself. Enjoying their blessings, they'll forget about God again, leading to tough times, leading to repentance and restoration. And so the pendulum would swing, over and over and over.

One important part of the book of course is the names of the specific judges, men and women of God, who led those reformations. God is always the One at work, but He does that work through the agency of human leaders.

Why does this matter? Because we live in a world that still does that same back-and-forth. When a nation decides to go its own way, the same social problems will re-emerge.

At that point, it becomes a matter of what follows. By the way, for believers the challenge is not to think that "If it has gotten bad, it will always continue to get worse." According to the book of Judges, the other very strong possibility is that people will notice the cost of going man's way, and decide to return to the God of the Bible.

Being human, I naturally don't know when the "next" reformation will come. But I do know that such a thing is always possible.

The invitation of the Lord remains in effect at all times: "If My people, who are called by My name, will humble themselves and pray and seek My face and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and will heal their land." II Chronicles 7:14

The book of Judges is full of several "reformations." The history of the Church is full of the same; one of them having been led by Martin Luther. That remains a possibility in our time, and we pray that it would come to us.

The Board of Evangelism: "Love Drives Prayer"

"Brothers and sisters, my heart's desire and my prayer to God for them is for their salvation.

For I testify about them that they have a zeal for God, but not in accordance with knowledge. For not knowing about God's righteousness and seeking to establish their own, they did not subject themselves to the righteousness of God. For Christ is the end of the Law for righteousness to everyone who believes."

Romans 10:1-4 NASB2020

Have you ever wondered how to love people who do not know Jesus? Here in Romans 10, Paul is calling to the Jewish people, his brothers and sisters, and sharing his heart's desire for their salvation. He testifies that they have a zeal for God but are ignorant of His righteousness, attempting to establish their own. They don't understand that Christ gives to those who trust in Him everything they are trying to get by keeping His laws.



The first step towards loving those who do not know Jesus is to pray consistently for them. We must first talk to God about the people we want to see saved and then talk to those people about God. Paul's heart was broken for the people who didn't know Christ, and he prayed for them. We too must start with prayer. What if we prayed fervently for the lost people who don't know Christ? Who in your life is far from God but close to you? God is giving you a mission

field right there. There may be people for whom we have been praying for years and they are still uninterested in the Gospel of Christ. But we must not give up; we must keep praying.

We must write their names down and pray for them daily. We must trust that God is working behind the scenes, even when we do not see it. We must persist in prayer.

We typically think of evangelism as talking to people about God, but it is also talking to God about people. We ask God to move in their hearts and draw them to Himself. Let us make it our daily practice to pray for the salvation of those who do not know Christ. Let us ask God to open doors for us to share the Gospel with them, to give us the right words.

Let God do His work. Take up the challenge to pray every day for the next week for that person. Ask God to provide an opportunity for you to point them to Jesus.

The Social Ministry Board is sponsoring a Baby Shower to support Birthright of Columbia. The agency is collaborating with USC Nursing Students who choose to volunteer at the center as a part of their required first semester curriculum. The students organize, prepare, and host this massive baby shower benefiting

expectant moms who need our support. The collection receptacle will be in the narthex beginning Sunday, October 15th - through Sunday, November 5th. A comprehensive list of needs will be published in the coming weeks.

Birthright began in Toronto, Canada, in 1968, when Louise Summerhill, a busy wife and mother of seven children, felt something should be done to help women facing unplanned pregnancies. Twelve years later, in 1980, Hank and Sally Chardos opened the Columbia SC chapter, now one of about 250 locations served by <u>Birthright International</u>. Some of the services they provide include:


Love & Support - Services are always free and available to any woman regardless of age, race, circumstances, religion, marital status, or financial situation. When expectant moms are ready to talk, trained Birthright staff and volunteers are ready to listen. Their services are non-judgmental and completely confidential.

Referrals - The center provides referrals for medical support, financial, legal and employment resources, housing, counselling and more. They also provide information about pregnancy, parenting, adoption, child safety programs, personal development and more. If you know of anyone who is desperate and confused, their National 24/7 Hotline Number is: 800-550-4900.

Following is Martin Luther's description of the seal he created after The Reformation:



First, there is a black cross in a heart that remains its natural color. This is to remind me that it is faith in the Crucified One that saves us. Anyone who believes from the heart will be justified (Romans 10:10). It is a black cross, which mortifies and causes pain, but it leaves the heart its natural color. It doesn't destroy nature, that is to say, it does not kill us but keeps us alive, for the just shall live by faith in the Crucified One (Romans 1:17). The heart should stand in the middle of a white rose. This is to show that faith gives joy, comfort, and peace—it puts the believer into a white, joyous rose. Faith does not give peace and joy like the world gives (John

14:27). This is why the rose must be white, not red. White is the color of the spirits and angels (cf. Matthew 28:3; John 20:12). This rose should stand in a sky-blue field, symbolizing that a joyful spirit and faith is a beginning of heavenly, future joy, which begins now, but is grasped in hope, not yet fully revealed. Around the field of blue is a golden ring to symbolize that blessedness in heaven lasts forever and has no end. Heavenly blessedness is exquisite, beyond all joy and better than any possessions, just as gold is the most valuable and precious metal.



Board of Stewardship

"For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God; not as a result of works, that no one should boast." Ephesians 2:8-9

On October 29th, we will celebrate Reformation Sunday and treasure the three Solas of the Reformation: grace alone, faith alone, and Scripture alone. The text above emphasizes grace alone and faith alone. Scripture alone will be discussed more fully next month.

The Reformation led to Bibles being more available in the languages of the common people and to more hymns being written in these languages. Some examples follow:

Verse 3 of "Rock of Ages" (LSB 761) emphasizes our total dependence on God's grace in Christ:

"Nothing in my hand I bring; Simply to Thy cross I cling.

Naked, come to Thee for dress; Helpless, look to Thee for grace;

Foul, I to the fountain fly; Wash me, Savior, or I die."

Verses 1 and 2 of "Jesus, Thy Blood and Righteousness" (LSB 563) speak of the joy flowing from saving faith:

"Jesus, Thy blood and righteousness My beauty are, my glorious dress; Midst flaming worlds in these arrayed, With joy shall I lift up my head.

"Bold shall I stand in that great day, Cleansed and redeemed, no debt to pay; Fully absolved through these I am From sin and fear, from guilt and shame."



Verse 4 of "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" (translation by Frederick Hodge) speaks of Christian confidence in spite of opposition from unbelievers, false teachers in the professing church, and powerful temporal authorities:

"That word above all earthly powers, No thanks to them, abideth;

The Spirit and the gifts are ours Through him who with us sideth;

Let goods and kindred go, This mortal life also;

The body they may kill; God's truth abideth still, His kingdom is forever."

Let us be grateful for a church that upholds the authority and inerrancy of Scripture. Let us be in church weekly, in prayer and Bible study daily, and in Bible class when possible. Let us support this church with our time, effort, and resources. Let us reach out to unbelieving and unchurched family, friends, co-workers, and neighbors.

Judges shows God's grace by showing that it was through the mercy of God that Israel was not absorbed into the pagan nations around her. There was a recurring cycle during the period that the judges ruled: the people's disobedience and rejection of God, followed by their crying out to Him, and then the nation's repentance, and God's deliverance through a judge....

Obadiah is the prophet that tells the Israelites that Edom (Esau's descendants) will not be the nation that the Messiah will come from, but He will come through the line of Jacob.

Malachi is the last prophet of the grace of God. He tells Israel about the coming of Jesus and the coming of the prophet John the Baptist.

The book of Isaiah gives Messianic prophecies to Israel: God is the "Holy One of Israel", who punishes his rebellious people and then redeems them.


