What Is the Pericopal System?

Long ago, the Early Church designed a system of Scripture Readings for every Sunday of the year.

Some readings are obvious. On Easter Sunday, you read the Gospel accounts of the resurrection of Jesus. On Christmas Eve you read passages promising the Savior, and then passages about His birth. On Pentecost you read Acts 2.

All those readings were easily assigned. Then what to do with the rest of the year? Fairly early on the Church had created the Seasons of the Year, and each of those Seasons has their own themes. Epiphany is about the revelation of Jesus as being the Christ. So throughout Epiphany we read things about "Jesus as the Light of the World," or about miracles that demonstrate Him to be the Christ. Advent has readings about preparing for the coming of the Lord. The lengthy "Season after Trinity" became be an essentially sequential reading through the Life of Christ.

Way back when, there was a system for just one year. You had a set of readings, and you did them this year, then the same readings the following year, and the following year.

One peculiarity of the old system was that there were usually just two readings appointed for each Sunday. One reading was from an Epistle, and the other was from a Gospel. The Old Testament was seldom read, and then only when it was a passage that very directly spoke of the coming Christ.

So how did we get to where we are now?

These days, we have a Three-Year Cycle, and each Sunday has three readings, one from the Old Testament, one from an Epistle, and one from a Gospel.

Here is a fun fact: As all of the Liturgical Churches met in consultation about readings, it was the Roman Catholic Church that proposed we move to three readings over a three-year cycle. Why did they propose this? Because it put more Bible in the ears of the people.

I have always thought of that as being a "fun fact," since many Protestants too often say that Catholics don't care about the Bible as much we do. Of course that's not true, and we ought to acknowledge that our brothers and sisters in the Catholic Church gave us the system we use today.

The overall structure of those readings is preserved throughout the Liturgical Churches, although each Church has the freedom to make some small edits. Apart from those minor changes, on any given Sunday you will hear the same readings in a Catholic Church, in a Lutheran Church, and in Anglican Church.

Here is one more odd wrinkle: Some churches have lately returned to "The One-Year Lectionary." They favor its historicity, but have added a weekly Old Testament reading. Some prefer it because it is the "Lectionary of Luther." They also feel that reading the same passages repeatedly makes them that much more familiar.

I prefer "The Three-Year Lectionary" for the same reason it was originally proposed: it puts more Scripture in the ears of the people. Anyway, that's the story behind "Why we do it that way..."

From Our Associate Pastor: The Angelus Painting by Jean-François Millet

The Angelus painting was commissioned by Thomas Gold Appleton, a wealthy Bostonian of Irish descent. The painting was possibly inspired by the memories of the recent disastrous Irish potato famine, or as it is also known as The Great Hunger. Thomas ultimately declined to accept the painting, so in desperation to sell it, Millet was forced to add the church in the background to market it.

In 1845, Millet would comment on his work, "The idea for The Angelus came to me because I remembered, while working in the fields and hearing the church bell, my grandmother always

made us stop to say the Angelus prayer for the poor departed, very religiously, with cap in hand". (The *Angelus* is a daily prayer common in Catholic countries). In the painting, you can see a husband and wife taking a moment out of their day for a prayer even though it is harvest time. The church in the background invites the idea of bells signaling the momentary halt of the harvest. No doubt that this scene has more impact in an agrarian society, but the takeaway is there for everyone.

Do you ever find yourself so caught up in the day-to-day work, or activities to forget to pray? We are told in the letter to the Philippians, "Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." Psalm 50:15 reminds us to "call upon Me in the day of trouble; I will deliver you, and you shall glorify Me." Prayer is essential to the life of a Christian, and Millet's painting reminds us that there will always be other things going on, but we are to take time to pray: when times are good; when times are bad; when giving thanks; or when asking for courage. I hope this image of The Angelus, reminds you to take time in your own life for prayer.

When you look at this work what do you see? Does anything else stand out to you? Do you hear the church bells echoing in the distance? Do you hear the call to pray?

"'Now listen, Joshua the high priest, you and your friends who are sitting in front of you – indeed they are men who are a symbol, for behold, I am going to bring in My servant the Branch. For behold, the stone that I have set before Joshua; on one stone are seven eyes. Behold, I will engrave an inscription on it', declares the LORD of hosts, 'and I will remove the iniquity of that land in one day.'"

Zechariah 3:8-9

It sounds like a prediction of the crucifixion of Christ, doesn't it? And there are several more predictions of the passion of Christ in Zechariah, which was included in the January, 2024 congregational reading plan.

Zechariah 9:9 predicts the triumphal entry on the first Palm Sunday. "Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion! Shout in triumph, O daughter of Jerusalem! Behold, your King is coming to you, He is just and endowed with salvation, Humble, and mounted on a donkey, Even on a colt, the foal of a donkey."

Zechariah 9:11 speaks of how Jesus would make atonement for the sins of the world:

"As for you also, because of the blood of My covenant with you I have set your prisoners free from the waterless pit."

Zechariah 14 speaks of a time when the church would be severely persecuted followed by the return of Christ Jesus in judgment bringing relief and joy to the Christians and endless torment to unbelievers. Do not envy the sons of this world; pity them.

This Lenten season let us be in church on Sundays (and on Wednesdays if feasible); in Sunday Bible class if feasible; and in Bible study and prayer daily. Let us give generously of our time, efforts and resources to spread the gospel of Christ crucified for our sins and raised for our justification. And let us reach out to unbelieving and unchurched family, friends, neighbors and co-workers.

The Board of Evangelism: The Task of Evangelism

Then He said to His disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into His harvest field." Matthew 9:37-38

Have you ever shared the good news of Jesus with someone in your life?

When Jesus was teaching and training the twelve disciples, He often used imagery and metaphors that were part of their culture to communicate important truths to them. In Matthew 9:37-38, Jesus relates the work that He is doing to a farmer's work in the field.

Jesus says that the people who do not know Jesus are like a field of grain that is ready to be harvested. But there are not enough workers to go and harvest among the fields. Jesus says to pray that God would send more workers to gather the harvest.

Essentially, there are people that are ready and willing to hear and respond to the gospel message, the hope that Jesus brings for every person. But when Jesus says "the workers are few" (Matthew 9:38), what He really means is: there are not enough people sharing the good news with others.

As Christians, we are entrusted with the free gift of eternal life, and we're tasked with sharing that message with others. However, many Christians keep their faith to themselves.

We are to be bold in sharing the message of the cross with other people so that they can experience new life in Jesus, too.

Take a few minutes today to consider what small step you can take to begin sharing Jesus with other people. Ask your neighbors, co-workers, or friends what their spiritual background is so that you can begin having spiritual conversations. Pray for God to give you courage and then step out and begin sharing with others.

Board of Social Ministry: Programs We Support

Thank You Mt Olive

John 15:12: "My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you", a simple command and one that brings peace, comfort, and joy. The Social Ministry Board is trying to apply this command to all of the projects we undertake. What a telling experience we witness as we see our Mt. Olive Family following right along with the projects we undertake to meet the needs of

others. With the generosity of our Mt. Olive Family we were able to provide a Christmas for so many families experiencing difficult circumstances. THANK YOU to everyone who sponsored a family! It is quite an experience to watch God at work!

Sister Care (28 moms and children were overjoyed with their gifts.) Sister Care advocates for domestic violence survivors and their children to promote prevention of domestic violence. They offer crisis planning, support and services for those in abusive relationships and their children. They also provide long term support, shelter, and services for those who have left abusive relationships.

Lutheran Family Services – New American's Program – (16 plus moms with children were helped including children who do not have a mom and were forced to migrate out of their country). This program is designed to help new arrivals become acclimated to life in the United States. Arranging housing, facilitating social services, public benefits, health screening school enrollment, basic human care needs...and the list goes on! Over 15.2 million people worldwide have been forced to flee their home countries.


Sharing God's Love (18 teens were thrilled with your generosity). Sharing God's Love was organized in 1984 when representatives from a few churches in the area got together and agreed that there needed to be a central location where community families facing emergencies related to their basic living needs could be served. Thus, they began to establish this ministry to provide food, clothing, and financial assistance to those in need. In 2022, Sharing God's Love served 6,958 people (2,322 families) of which 464 were new families needing our services. The numbers grew exponentially in 2023!








Signs at the Church Entrance


