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From Pastor Walt: "Christ is Risen"

Last month, my newsletter article was about "The Pericopal System," all those readings appointed for each week of the year. In pointing out that some Sundays have an easily defined focus, I wrote: "On Easter Sunday, you read the Gospel accounts of the resurrection of Jesus. On Christmas Eve you read passages promising the Savior, and then passages about His birth. On Pentecost you read Acts 2."



And so it is. This year Easter is March 31^{st} . Guess what we'll be reading in Church? Mark 16:1-8.

As I also pointed out last month, there are readings for every week; and they happen in a three-year cycle. Year A focuses on the Gospel of Matthew; Year B focuses on the Gospel of Mark; and Year C focuses on the Gospel of Luke. (The Gospel of John is dispersed throughout all three years.) This year is Year B, so that puts us in the Gospel of Mark.

Here's something you can't miss: All four Gospels say that Jesus rose from the dead on Easter Sunday. He was crucified, died, was observed to be dead by both His followers and the Roman soldiers. He was placed in a tomb on Friday afternoon. Saturday was a "day of silence." Then on Sunday morning He was alive from the grave, literally and historically.

The soldiers saw the angels and fainted. The women met the angels. The women then met the risen Jesus. The other disciples met the risen Jesus. Hundreds of disciples met the risen Jesus over the next 40 days. There is not a single place that the Bible ever says anything other than: Jesus is alive from the dead.

In the Book of Acts, it is preached in every sermon. Jesus was the Messiah; He was betrayed into the hands of evil men who killed Him; He rose from the dead, and we have seen this with our own eyes.

The Epistles continue to talk about it. They explain "What does this mean?" They apply it to our own faith walk.

Paul met the risen Jesus on the road to Damascus, and he says so without any bit of doubt or wavering.



It's as clear as it can be. Jesus was crucified, dead, buried, and alive from His grave. Paul goes even farther in I Corinthians 15. He says that "If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins." Of course he quickly adds, "But Christ has indeed been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep."

It is the constant and consistent witness of the Early Church. They preached it, wrote about it, and went to their own deaths confessing it.

"Christ is risen!"

"He is risen indeed!"

The Board of Public Relations: Passover and Easter

We know that the Old Testament points to Jesus. The parallel between the Passover and Easter really shows how God knew humanity needed a perfect lamb to save us from sin. Here are a few examples of how the Old Testament book of Exodus points to Jesus:

- The lamb had to be without blemish, without cuts, bruises, or deformities. Jesus was without blemish. He was sinless.
- The lamb had to be one year old, in the prime of his life. Jesus was in the prime of His life when He was sacrificed as a young man, 33 years old.
- The lamb had to be a male. Jesus came to earth as a man.
- The Israelites weren't allowed to break the bones of the Lamb during the cooking of and not even during the eating. Jesus' bones didn't get broken during the torture and the mockery He endured or the crucifixion.
- The lamb died in place of the first-born of the Israelites. Jesus died in our place. He was the "firstborn of many brethren". He died on the cross in order to reconcile us with God.
- The Israelites had to sprinkle the blood of the lamb on their doorposts, top of the door frame and on the threshold that formed a cross, so the hand of death would Passover them. Jesus' blood saved us from death so we can have eternal life.
- The lamb opened a way to freedom for the Jews from years of slavery in Egypt. Jesus' sacrifice sets us free us from the bondage of sin.

As you can see, the Old Testament really does point to Jesus!



Palm Sunday commemorates the day Jesus entered Jerusalem and was greeted by people waving palm branches. This event serves as a reminder for Christians to welcome Jesus into their hearts and be ready to follow Him.



Maundy Thursday commemorates the Last Supper, where the first institution of the Lord's Supper or communion was given by Jesus to His disciples in the upper room.



Good Friday commemorates the crucifixion and death of Jesus. It's a significant holiday because it reminds followers that Jesus died for the sins of humanity so that we may be perfect in the sight of God.



Easter, also called Resurrection Sunday, commemorates the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. He was crucified by the Romans in 30 AD. After being buried for 3 days, He conquered sin, death, and the devil so we may have eternal life.

From Pastor Colin: "Christ in the Desert," by Ivan Kramskoi, 1887

"Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil." Matthew 4:1

During a time when Paris was the center of the art world, Ivan Kramskoi, a Russian painter

created "Christ in the Desert." Different from the impressionists of the time, he focused on capturing people's faces. We are left with few records as to his thoughts on this painting. So, before I take a moment to delve into some of the symbolism, I would like you all to take a moment and really dive into the work. Think about what you see. What jumps out at you? And remember, this is in the context of Matthew 4, Jesus' temptation.



Several things stand out to me. First, Jesus has been fasting for 40 days. I think sometimes His hunger gets glossed over. I don't know

about you, but I tried to fast for a week. I only made it 5 days and I was ready to eat my arm! So I stopped early and binged. I was ravenous. So here we see the state of Jesus 40 days into that fast: his eyes sunken, his skin clinging to his bones, his gauntness, his sitting, and tiredness. Looking closer, his face looks sunburned, as he has been in the elements 40 days. Here we see Jesus at his human limit; he still is all God, but his body is at the human limit.

Next, we continue to look at Jesus's hands, clasped in prayer tightly. He reminds us that in times of fasting, we turn to our father in heaven when we struggle or when times are tough.

If we follow Jesus's gaze, where does it lead? Look closely. He is staring at something. A single stone meets Jesus' gaze. Has it been placed on its side? It is irregular so as to catch our eye. Why? If you look at all the other stones, they look like rocks, but here, its uprightness and Jesus's gaze lead us to ask, what is special about this stone? Then we hear the words of Satan, "If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to become bread." The temptation. You, too, feel the pull of the stone, to heed the devil's whispers and eat, to end the suffering. And while you don't see the devil directly, his presence is in the art.

Look to the darkness on the page; beyond Jesus, there is an encroaching sunset that seems to be swallowing up the desert. In addition, Jesus, the light of the world, is cloaked in darkness. But you might see the light as a sunrise that gives you hope that the darkness is passing away. Jesus is there in the midst it. I am reminded of John 1: "In Him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it."

I could go on, as the longer I look at this painting, I find more. How some of the rock formations look like faces or how this temptation feels like an anti-garden of Eden. But I do want you to explore for yourself. Go in the peace of the Lord.

Nursery "Cry Room" Reminder





