From Our Pastor: "Can these bones live?"

Ezekiel 37:1-3, "The hand of the LORD was upon me, and He brought me out by the Spirit of the LORD and set me in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. He led me back and forth among them, and I saw a great many bones on the floor of the valley, bones that were very dry. He asked me, 'Son of man, can these bones live?' I said, 'O Sovereign LORD, You alone know.'"



Whenever this reading comes up in our worship life, several people suggest to me that the Hymn of the Day should've been "Dem Bones, Dem Bones." Strangely, that one wasn't included in our hymnal.

But setting that to the side, Ezekiel 37 is really one of the most important chapters of the Bible.

To be very disciplined in our thinking, we should bear in mind that its message most directly was to the people of the Babylonian Captivity. For them, it was a promise of God to restore the nation after all that they had been through. Sure enough, Babylon fell, and Israel was restored under the benign reign of the Persians. So historically, this word of the Lord is fulfilled!

But like many Old Testament passages, there's also "the principle of the thing." And that principle is that from time to time a nation which formerly followed God will drift away. When that happens there are predictable social costs. And then some people will begin to wonder: Can we be revived?



That Ezekiel was feeling pretty discouraged is seen in the way he answers the Lord's question. God asked him: Can these bones live? And Ezekiel doesn't have the strength to say, "Absolutely, yes they can!" Instead, he resignedly said, "Lord, You alone know."

So God instructed his deflated prophet to speak! This is always the beginning: to hear the Word of the Lord. Not my word, not your word, not any human's word. The Word of the Lord must be spoken.

So bone came to bone...and the people of God started to sing, "Dem bones."

The next moment in the text is key. Bones had come together, and tendons and muscles appeared on the bones. "But there was no breath in them." This shows us that it's never enough for a church to "seem alive." It must actually be led by the Spirit of God.

So God told Ezekiel to speak to the "breath" (and here there's an ambiguity in the text; is it "wind," or "breath," or "spirit," or even best: "Spirit"), and the breath entered the lives of the people of God.

Is that called "Revival," or "Renewal," or "Reformation"? Whichever word you prefer, we need it! I sort of like the word "Return." As in Malachi 3:7, "'Return to Me, and I will return to you,' says the LORD Almighty."

Polls say that most Americans think "something is wrong." That is, we are all seeing the dry bones on the floor of the valley. But can those bones live? And how would they?



KFUO radio, the official voice of the LCMS, is the oldest continually operating Christian radio station in the world. It began broadcasting on December 14, 1924. You can go to https://www.kfuo.org in your browser to listen to KFUO on your computer.

Some weekday talk programs I sometimes listen to are "Law and Gospel" at 10:30 AM, "Daily Chapel from the LCMS International Center" at 11:00 AM, "Thy Strong Word" at 12:00 PM, and "Issues, Etc." at 4:00 PM.

Some Saturday talk programs I sometimes listen to are "Liberty Action Alert from the Lutheran Center for Religious Freedom" at 10:30 AM, "Concord Matters" at 11:00 AM and "Cross Defense" at 12:00 PM. I also listen to some of the sacred music. About 2:00 PM on weekdays, there is a segment where the Ten Commandments, the Apostles' Creed, and the Lord's Prayer are recited. About 3:00 PM listeners are invited to confess the Apostles' Creed. Shortly before 4:00 PM listeners are invited to join in praying the Lord's Prayer.

When listening to KFUO does not interfere with work, I leave it on. When work responsibilities require, I turn it off. It enables me to be more grounded during the work day.

Since 2020, I have been contributing yearly to KFUO. You might want to consider doing so, provided that it would not require you to diminish your local church contribution.

Let us be grateful for a church that upholds the authority and inerrancy of Scripture. Let us be in church weekly, in prayer and Bible study daily, and in Bible class when possible. Let us support this church with our time, effort and resources. Let us reach out to unbelieving and unchurched family, friends, co-workers, and neighbors.

Mt. Olive Lutheran hosts two blood drives every year as a way to support our community. The next drive will be this summer on July 15th from 10:00 AM until 3:00 PM. Thanks to the Mt. Olive members, community friends, and walk-ins who are vigilant about donating. All blood donations go to our local hospitals and they plan around the community's

donations. Look for details in the upcoming weeks on how to register to give blood.

A few facts about blood donations you may find interesting:

Whole Blood Donation: Whole blood is the most flexible type of donation. It can be transfused in its original form, or used to help multiple people when separated into its specific components of red cells, plasma, and platelets.

Who it helps: Whole blood is frequently given to trauma patients and people undergoing surgery. Donation frequency is every 56 days or up to 6 times per year.

Power Red Donation: During a Power Red donation, you give a concentrated dose of red cells, the part of your blood used every day for those needing transfusions. This type of donation uses an automated process that separates your red blood cells from the other blood components, and then safely and comfortably returns your plasma and platelets to you. With just a little extra time at your appointment, you can donate more red cells and increase your impact on patients in need.

Who it helps: Red cells from a Power Red donation are typically given to trauma patients, newborns and emergency transfusions during birth, people with sickle cell anemia, and anyone suffering blood loss. Donation frequency is every 112 days, up to 3 times per year.
