"Do not move an ancient boundary stone set up by your forefathers." Proverbs 22:28



As I write my newsletter article this month we're literally getting ready to pack for vacation. One part of that packing is deciding, "Which Bible am I bringing?" Sometimes I don't pack a Bible at all, and assume the hotel will have one. (Thank you, Gideons!)

Concordia

When we're home, I do my Bible-reading from the Concordia

Self-Study Bible. It's NIV, which I prefer. And it's an excellent Study Bible produced by our Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. By which I mean that the notes are orthodox.

But a Study Bible is too bulky to throw into a suitcase. So I'll do what I usually do: I'll bring along the Bible that was given out to all the participants in the 2010 National Youth Gathering, Why this one?

- 1) This Bible is NIV, which I prefer.
- 2) This Bible is small enough to travel easily, but big enough to still be read by my 61-year old eyes.
- 3) This Bible doesn't have as many notes as a full Study Bible, but it does have a few helpful notes.
- 4) This is the Bible that was given out at the National Youth Gathering that I attended with both of our sons.

And that's what Prov. 22:28 is about. It's true to say that "We all have a history." But it's also true to say that "We all have a history with God." And if so, then there are little markers along the way, reminders, "boundary stones."

I've been to four Youth Gatherings. All of them have been fun and rewarding in their own ways. I've gotten the "freebie" Bible from all of those Gatherings. But it will always be a favorite memory the time Jim and Joe and I were at the Gathering together.

So this Bible goes into the suitcase again. It's a Bible, and it will serve for my daily Bible reading. It's got a few helpful notes that I'll look at. But it also has some fond memories behind it. And those will go with me too.

(P.S., the next National Youth Gathering will be July 19-23, 2025.)

From our Associate Pastor: The Triumph of Christianity over Paganism by Gustave Doré

Gustave Doré (1832-1883) was a prolific French artist, renowned for his detailed and dramatic illustrations. This painting symbolizes the transition from ancient pagan practices to the rise of Christianity, capturing the moment of transformation with emotional and visual intensity.

The 19th century saw a resurgence in religious art, partly as a response to the scientific and industrial advancements of the time, which some feared were leading society away from spiritual values.

The painting vividly represents the biblical theme of triumph over false idols and the spread of true faith. Several Bible verses resonate with this theme:

- I Kings 18:20-40: The story of Elijah and the prophets of Baal, where Elijah proves the power of the one true God over the false gods of Baal.
- Acts 19:23-41: Paul's mission in Ephesus, where he challenges the worship of the goddess Artemis, leading to a riot by those who profited from making idols.



Revelation 21:4: "He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away." This verse speaks to the idea of a new, divine order replacing the old ways.

In biblical terms, light often symbolizes truth, purity, and the presence of God, while darkness represents sin, falsehood, and separation from God. It is no surprise that the top of the painting is bathed in light, while the false gods are shrouded in darkness.

- ✤ John 1:5: "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it."
- Ephesians 5:8: "For you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Live as children of light."

As you look at Gustave Doré's work, the most recognizable figure on the bottom half is Zeus, clutching his thunderbolt in vain. I encourage you to look and see what other pagan gods you recognize—it's like a "Where's Waldo" for paganism.

The main takeaway from this painting is that it is triumphant and unashamed. Many today like the idea of coexisting with other religions or hold a belief in Unitarianism. But Christ preaches exclusivity and speaks about how He is "the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me" (John 14:6). By extension, this message rejects all other ways.

In conclusion, Gustave Doré's "The Triumph of Christianity over Paganism" is not just a historical artwork but a profound visual sermon that continues to inspire and challenge believers today.

Pentecost is not merely a past, historical event, when the apostles received the Holy Spirit, but it is also for us in the Church today. There are some important things for Christians to remember about Pentecost.

Jesus spent His 33 years walking this earth spreading the Good News about His Father, teaching us how to live by loving God first and our neighbors as our selves.

The Holy Spirit was given to us to be our conscious; that is, to continue to live according all that Jesus taught us. It invites us to pray for comfort and hope. The Spirit—our Helper—does not give us over to discouragement, but strengthens us in our faith. He reminds us that Christ, our Savior saved us from sin and death, holds us firmly in His undying grip, and helps us hold firmly to Him. The Spirit consoles us, confirming in us the belief that God's Word is true and His promises sure. The Spirit gives us joy in the midst of grief, peace in the face of fear. The Spirit unites believers through the bond of peace. As the apostle Paul testifies, the Spirit calls us to one hope, the hope of the glorious salvation life of Christ.

The Holy Spirit, like Jesus, has an intimate relationship with each of us. If you listen to the Spirit, you will know when someone or something is leading you away from God. At that time you should be praying for guidance, searching the scriptures for God's truths.

The Board of Evangelism: "How (Not) to Save the World: Fight to Be Right"

"Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God were making an appeal through us; we beg you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God." 2 Corinthians 5:20

When I (Hosanna Wong) was eighteen years old, my dad died from cancer. My little brother, Elijah, was twelve, and he shut down emotionally and would not speak to anyone about what he was feeling. He didn't want to talk about my dad, much less, God. It seemed there was no way to connect with him.

I was hundreds of miles away at college, and when I would call to ask how he was doing, all he wanted to do was talk about comic books. I soon realized that if I wanted to have a relationship with my brother, I had to immerse myself in his world. I had to start reading comic books. Not just on a shallow level, but I needed to fall in love with what he loved. I needed to learn how he saw the world. Over the next couple of months, whenever I'd call him, we had a lot to talk about.

When we take the time to enter someone else's world, we can speak more effectively into their real life. So often we want to do and say the right thing, but we don't consider the context of who is listening on the other end of our perfected, spiritual speeches.

Often, we get mad at those in our lives who are not where we want them to be, and don't see the world the way we see it. But, to effectively show who Jesus really is and the life He truly offers, we need to step into their world, learn their words and ways, and fight for the relationship. We need to love others as God has loved us. Before they love us, love them. Before they choose us, choose them. Before they step into our world, step into theirs.

One of the names of Jesus is Immanuel, meaning God with us. He calls us to be with people too: To hear why they're hurting; To be present in their pain. Many times, your greatest witness will be your **with-ness**. God is asking us to really get to know people so that they can really know Him. It won't be easy, but it will change lives. It will help others know how loved they are. Nobody hates being loved.



We need to stop fighting to be right, and start fighting for our

relationships. Who can you come alongside and be with, right where they are? Whose lens of the world can you learn? How would our families, our churches, and our world look differently if we were all fighting for people, not against people, and fighting for our relationships?

August 2024 Lectionary

Signs at the Church Entrance



As August rolls around, the church is one third of the way into its longest season, The Season after Pentecost. Watch for the Year B August sign at the entrance to the church. During year B of the church calendar, the Gospel scriptures generally come from Mark. However, the first three Sundays of August are readings from the Gospel of John, chapter 6, from the teaching of Jesus, "I am the bread of life." In the final Sunday of the month move back to Mark chapter 7 where the Pharisees try to trip up Jesus concerning their cleanliness rituals.

Here is the preview of the August sign. As you come into the church why not take the ramp and pause a few moments by the

sign to pick out the key words from each week's Gospel. Here is a little hint to help you out: the words on the signs are color coded by week! If you follow Mt. Olive on social media (mtolivesc) you will have seen posts of the weekly lectionary readings, so you can always use your smart phone to help you in your search.

It is no secret that our culture is becoming more hostile to Biblical Christianity. The downward cultural trend has continued for several years. We need to be in church (and hopefully Bible class) weekly and in Bible study and prayer daily to resist its downward pull.

Pastor Colin, in his July 14, 2024, sermon discussed the account from Mark 6 where John the Baptist was beheaded because he condemned King Herod's unlawful marriage to his brother's wife. We must speak out against sin with love. All people who are not believers in Christ are lost and condemned, no matter how virtuous they may seem. Jesus said in John 14:6, "*I am the way, and the truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father, but through me.*" Let us bear witness for Christ as we have opportunity. Let us remember Biblical examples of sinners who were brought to faith: Rahab the prostitute; Judah, who sold his younger brother, Joseph, into slavery; the woman at the well; the

thief on the cross; Saul of Tarsus; and others. Let us "*speak the truth in love.*" Ephesians 4:15. And let us remember to support this church with our time, talents, and resources.

Board of Social Ministry: Lutheran Services of the Carolinas

A New Home – A Fresh Start-- Lutheran Services Carolinas New Americans Program is dedicated to helping millions of people worldwide who have been forced to flee their home countries due to their race, religion, nationality, membership in a particular social group, or political opinion. These individuals are granted legal "refugee" status by the UNHCR (United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees) and the U.S. government. Many

have to live in designated refugee camps or move from place to place seeking shelter for years, even decades. While getting here is difficult, it accounts for only part of their journey.

LSC's New Americans Program is designed to welcome New Americans to our country and help them on their journey to achieve self-sufficiency. This program helps new arrivals acclimate to life in the US. Case managers work with families and co-sponsoring organizations to help facilitate the following services: arrange housing; coordinate access to social services and public benefits; arrange health screenings and access to healthcare; assist with school enrollment; provide cultural education and self-sufficiency planning; assist with communication needs; ensure access to English classes or one-on-one language tutoring.

During the months of October 1, 2023, through June 19, 2024, LSC has welcomed 327 refugees and SIV's. Here's the breakdown: Africa-75, East Asia-48, Latin America/Caribbean-69; Middle East/South Asia-135. Since a few weeks have passed since these numbers were calculated the numbers are even higher now! We are currently around 80 away from capacity and are on pace to hit 440 by October 1, 2024. Our local LSC office has proposed increasing their capacity to 500 for the next fiscal year. With the hundreds of resettles with people from regions all over the world, we can't do this without our amazing volunteers! Read the Bible in Three Years -August 2024

In July, our daily Bible readings took us to the Book of Deuteronomy, or *the second Law*. We will complete this last book of the Pentateuch on August 11th. We will finish out the month in the Old Testament reading two chapters per day from the Book of the Prophet Jeremiah. He is often called the weeping prophet because he is saddened that God's chosen people have turned away from Him and are on the brink of captivity and destruction. The people are listening to false prophets who tell them that all is well rather than listening to Jeremiah who is speaking the true Word of God. As you read through these parts of Israel's history, think and pray about current events in the U.S. and the world and how we can return to the Lord.
