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From Our Pastor: "Bringing Along the Communion Kit"

My loved one is sick; can one of our pastors visit? Yes, they can; and he's going to ask: "Do they want to receive communion?"

Every pastor I know has a portable little box that contains the elements of Communion. I'm not sure if there's a fancy liturgical name for it. Most pastors I know call it their "Communion Kit."

In it, there is a sleeve of cups, a little jar of wafers, and a bottle to hold some wine. Some are very simple and unadorned. This is fine, since Communion is "the elements plus the Word."

But having said that, many are somewhat nicely made. My Communion Kit has an attractive red cloth interior, with a metal cross and Luther's rose on it. Long ago, it was a gift from the LWML to all fourth year seminary students. It has served me ever since that time.



Part of Seminary is of course the classroom experience. But the other part of Seminary is something called the "Field Church." This is a local congregation in the vicinity of the Seminary, and every seminarian is assigned to work at one of those nearby congregations.

One afternoon I went with my Field Church supervisor, Pastor Jonathan Stein, on a shut-in visit. He'd brought with him a very old and tattered Communion Kit. It had all the necessary elements inside, but the exterior of it was well-worn leather.

"Where did he get it?" I asked. It was the one his father used when he was an Army chaplain in World War II. Pastor Stein had received it when his father retired from the ministry, and he had used it ever since. What a great joy it was for him to carry the same Communion Kit his father had used to commune the troops so long ago.

Not every visit will be a Communion visit. But any visit can be.

Is that desired? Then one of our pastors can be there, remembering to bring his Communion Kit. We'll sit and visit for a little bit; then read a devotional; then have the Body and Blood of Christ "given and shed for us, for the forgiveness of our sins."

From our Associate Pastor: Why the Resurrection Matters

As we speed toward the end of Lent and the coming of Holy Week—and eventually the joy of Easter—we reflect on the importance of this moment. That is, why does the Resurrection matter? If you were to remove the Resurrection of Christ from the narrative of the Bible, what would happen?

Some people claim that the disciples had a mass hallucination in their grief or that the Resurrection was a conspiracy—that the disciples wanted to trick the rulers of Israel into believing He had come back from the dead. Yet, to their dying breath, they never recanted what they witnessed, even under threat of death. As Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 15, “And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith. More than that, we are then found to be false witnesses about God... And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins.” (vv. 14-15, 17)

Without the Resurrection, there is no reason for us to gather on a Sunday morning. What does the Bible become if not just a collection of stories and moral tales? Without the Resurrection, everything we do as Christians is pointless. Furthermore, it would make Christ a liar or a madman. The rest of scripture serves the purpose of the coming of Christ due to the fall into sin and our need for a Savior. And if Christ died and remained dead, then scripture ultimately becomes a story of our damnation.

But Christ has risen! And because He has risen, our faith is not in vain. Sin is conquered, death is defeated, and we have the promise of eternal life. This is why Easter is not just another holiday—it is the foundation of our hope.

When we struggle with doubt, pain, or loss, we remember that the Resurrection assures us that suffering is not the end of the story. Just as Christ overcame the grave, so too will we share in His victory. Through Baptism, we are joined to Christ’s death and resurrection (Romans 6:4). In the Lord’s Supper, we receive His true body and blood, given for our forgiveness and strengthening in faith.

This Easter season, as we leave the Lenten tide, the Resurrection shines through. All the hardship of Holy Week is ultimately undone by the joy of Easter.

The Board of Evangelism:

"How then are they to call on Him in whom they have not believed?

How are they to believe in Him whom they have not heard?

And how are they to hear without a preacher?" Romans 10:14

You believe in your heart and you confess with your mouth. Those two aspects go hand in hand. At the end of this passage, Paul made it clear: how can someone come to faith without hearing the gospel? The gospel can only spread if Jesus' followers share it. Believers are also sent to share the gospel. This can be a specific calling, if you have the gift of evangelism, but it is also a general calling: every follower of Jesus is sent to share the gospel in his or her setting. That means you are sent. Do you see yourself as a sent person.

How do you see your faith? Is it a personal faith? Do you confess your faith? Do your friends, family, colleagues, and neighbors know that you believe in Jesus?

Maybe this is easy and natural for you, and that is great. If you are challenged with talking openly about your faith, try to take one step at a time. Do not overwhelm yourself, but set yourself a realistic goal. This might be to be open about your faith to one person during the next week. This does not mean that you have to tell them the whole gospel; it can mean that you just mention your faith in a conversation or situation. Don't expect too much too fast, but get used to being open about your faith. And observe the reactions of those people. As long as you talk about yourself and of your faith without pushing it onto them, most people are very respecting and open to hear about it.



If you are already used to sharing your faith with others, what is your experience with how they react? What could be a next step? People are often very open to being prayed for; or if they are interested, they might be happy to join you at a midweek Bible study. Either way, if you are just starting or already used to talking about your faith, what is your next step?

Board of Social Ministry: Birthright Baby Shower

The Social Ministry Board is sponsoring a Baby Shower to support Birthright of Columbia. The agency is collaborating with USC Nursing Students who opted to volunteer at the center as a part of their required first semester curriculum. The students organize, prepare, and host this massive baby shower benefiting expectant moms who need extra support. The collection receptacle will be in the narthex beginning Sunday, March 23 through Sunday, April 13th. A comprehensive list of needs is available on the table between the offices.

Birthright began in Toronto, Canada, in 1968, when Louise Summerhill, a busy wife and mother of seven children, felt something should be done to help women facing unplanned pregnancies. Twelve years later, in 1980, Hank and Sally Chardos opened the Columbia, SC chapter, now one of about 250 locations served by Birthright International. Some of the services they provide include:

Love & Support - Services are always free and available to any woman regardless of age, race, circumstances, religion, marital status, or financial situation. When expectant moms are ready to talk, trained Birthright staff and volunteers are ready to listen. Their services are non-judgmental and completely confidential.

Referrals - The center provides referrals for medical support, financial, legal and employment resources, housing, counselling and more. They also provide information about pregnancy, parenting, adoption, child safety programs, personal development and more. If you know of anyone who is desperate and confused, their National 24/7 Hotline Number is: 800-550-4900.

Board of Worship

As presented at the February Voter’s Meeting, the Board of Worship is organizing an effort to raise funds for a new organ to replace our current one, which has far exceeded its useful life. The estimated cost for a new Allen organ is \$107,400. However, if the congregation raises a significant portion by June 2025, we can save \$16,110 towards the purchase, which must be approved at a future Voters Meeting.

Kick off for this effort will be the first weekend in April. An anonymous donor has pledged a starting gift of \$10,000 and will match member donations dollar for dollar up to an additional \$10,000 during the month of April. Please prayerfully consider what monetary gifts you and your family can give toward this significant endeavor.

There are a number of ways to participate!

- ❖ **Donate a Key:** Sign up for one or more “organ keys” on the poster in the Narthex. There are several suggested amounts. Use the collection box or offering plate to drop off your gift.
- ❖ **Grab an Organ Donation Fund** envelope for a one time or recurring gift amount of your choosing, either by envelope or by e giving.
- ❖ **Loose change and bills** will also be collected weekly in the “Coins for Keys” jar.
- ❖ **Finally**, consider other donation options including memorial gifts, estate planning or even your Thrivent Choice dollars, which can be designated for this effort.

The Board of Public Relations: Colors of Lent, Holy Week and Easter

Have you ever wondered what the colors of the paraments, the cloths draped over the alter, in church mean? Starting with Lent, we have the purple paraments. The forty days of Lent use this deep, rich color which has come to represent somberness and solemnity, penitence, and prayer. Also, the dye that made the color in Jesus' day was very expensive, so royalty were the only ones who could afford garments made with it. Jesus wore a purple robe when the soldiers were mocking and belittling Him signifying that He was our king.

During Holy Week, from Palm Sunday to Maundy Thursday, scarlet is the color. Even though scarlet is used for festive occasions, during this time, it represents the blood that Jesus shed for us, a somber time!

Black is used twice during the year, Good Friday and Ash Wednesday. There is no mistaking the message that this sober color gives. Black is the absence of light. Good Friday, or Black Friday in combination with Ash Wednesday, calls for sober reflection on the cost of our redemption. Without Christ's sacrifice on the day the sky turned dark and hid the light of the sun, there would be no bright Light of Christ to live in, nor new life in Christ to enjoy.

Of course, we know that Easter's color is white, the color of purity and completeness. This color, used primarily during these Sundays, helps us to visualize the message that "though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be white as snow." Christ's triumph from the grave on Resurrection day is the cause for our rejoicing. His purity before his Father becomes our purity. White reinforces that message of joy. Gold can also be used on Easter Sunday. It represents value and worth. The golden festival of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ is the event that gives our lives meaning and worth. He is worthy of our praise as we adorn his altar with the color of splendor.



Signs at the Church Entrance: Holy Week & Easter

The Lent sign continues to be displayed during the first two weeks of April. And next is the most meaningful and significant time of the church year: Holy Week and Easter! After Palm Sunday, there are services and signs that commemorate Jesus' journey to the cross. As you come to these worship services on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday, pause to look at each sign to help you prepare for Jesus's journey for our salvation.

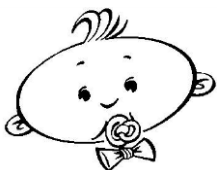
