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From Our Pastor

"Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give a reason for the hope you have. But do this with gentleness and respect." I Peter 3:15

I just recently read an article in which former U.S. Secretary of Education Bill Bennett said that Charlie Kirk "may have been the last American who genuinely believed you could change someone's mind with a good argument."

His point was that most of us have become so jaded that we assume that people think what they think and will never change. If that's so, then there's nothing left to talk about, and our politics come down to a head count to determine who gets to wield power. That has lamentably produced the frustration, anger, and occasional violence we now have in our national life.



You don't have to agree with everything that Charlie Kirk said to notice that he loved a discussion, especially a discussion with people who disagreed with him. There was that ever-present smile, his amazingly broad range of knowledge, and, as Dr. Bennett points out, the boyish enthusiasm that was meant to change hearts and minds through discussion.

So, here's a funny juxtaposition: Bill Maher is a man of the Left who in many ways is much like that. Once again, any one of us will disagree with Maher about his stance on any particular issue. But his

television show has that same enthusiasm for discussion, even very frank and pointed discussion, with the thought that we just somehow might arrive at the truth. To Maher's enduring credit, his show regularly has on it people with whom he disagrees, but with whom he is obviously delighted to have a vigorous exchange of ideas. It should be no surprise then that Charlie Kirk was once a guest on Bill Maher's show, and their conversation was everything you'd hoped it would be.

So, in this month in which we celebrate the Reformation of the Church, isn't this the project of the Church? We want to change hearts and minds by the discussion of, and search for, truth.

Come to think of it, Martin Luther was probably rather idealistic when he started the Reformation. There were errors in the Church that needed to be corrected; and he just pointed them out.

Frankly, St. Peter urged this on us, too. Christ has made a difference in our lives. We should speak of it.

In recent days I've heard many Christians saying that they used to feel uncomfortable talking about their faith, but watching Charlie Kirk has made them emboldened to do so. Well, good!

"Always be ready to give an answer." That's how Peter saw it. And as I've always pointed out, the verse doesn't end there. He continued: "But do this with gentleness and respect."



That's the balance we try to maintain. Not too shy to speak of Christ, but not too bold so as to become obnoxious. Able to give an answer, but always gentle and respectful. And maybe just naïve enough to think that doing so might make a difference.

The Reformation: The Peace of Augsburg (1555)

Every October, we celebrate the Reformation and reflect on how God preserved His Church through trials, conflicts, and reforms. While Martin Luther's posting of the 95 Theses in 1517 is well known, the story of the Reformation stretches far beyond that moment. One important milestone came in, 1555, with the signing of the Peace of Augsburg.

This Peace represents a critical moment that allowed the Lutheran Church to become a recognized entity. After decades of religious conflict and calls for reform, the rulers of the Holy Roman Empire signed the treaty, granting legal recognition to Lutheranism and offering a measure of protection to its followers.

At the heart of the agreement was the principle of Cuius Regio,

Eius Religio: "whose realm, his religion." This meant that the ruler of each territory determined whether the land would follow Roman Catholicism or Lutheranism. To modern ears, this may sound restrictive, as it did not allow individual freedom of religion as we understand it today. Yet for the Lutheran Church, it was a historic step forward. For the first time, believers were legally protected and could worship openly, though their freedom depended largely on the province in which they lived. Not a perfect solution, but one that allowed the Church to flourish, and Bibles to be printed in the common language of the people.

The Peace of Augsburg reminds us that the Church has often faced struggles in a world that resists God's truth. Yet through it all, God has preserved His people and His Gospel. Just as the Israelites were delivered from persecution and exile, God sustains His Church through every trial.



As Lutherans, we can look back with gratitude, remembering that our freedom to gather around Word and Sacrament today was not easily won. It was purchased through perseverance, faithfulness, and God's sustaining grace. May this reminder encourage us to value our ability to gather and worship, teach, and fellowship without persecution. So let us not take for granted what was once fought for and protected, but instead use our freedom to boldly proclaim Christ, encourage one another, and live as witnesses to the hope we have in Him.


Board of Christian Education

Through the month of October, we will finish reading Nehemiah and follow with five of the books of minor prophets. Last, we will begin reading the major prophet Ezekiel. Here is a quick overview.

Nehemiah was written to chronicle the rebuilding of the temple and the city of Jerusalem after 70 years of captivity in Babylon. The first four minor prophet books that we will be reading are from different times in history to warn the northern kingdom of Israel or the southern kingdom of Judah (and other surrounding countries) of God's anger toward their unfaithfulness and to repent of their sin. Neither nation repents and both are defeated and taken into captivity, Israel in the 700's BC and Judah in the 600's-500's BC. Then we fast forward to Nehemiah's time where Haggai and Ezekiel encourage those who are rebuilding Jerusalem.

During this whirlwind journey, you may want to check out the introductions to the books in your Lutheran Study Bible or listen to the overview of each book on The Bible Project website.
